Beauty and the Beast, by Gail Bowen. The accomplished Regina author gives her non-musical take on the timeless tale of the spoiled young prince who is transformed into a beast and must learn to discover a true human spirit. Dates: November 29-December 2, 2023. Director: Dallas Duffus.

The Black Bonspiel of Wullie MacCrimmon, by W.O. Mitchell. Souls are on the line in the Prairie retelling of the Faust legend by one of Saskatchewan's finest story-tellers. It's the perfect prelude to the Canadian men's curling championship (The Brier) to be held in Regina the following month.

Dates: February 14-17, 2024. Director: Tyler Toppings.

The Ladies Foursome, by Norm Foster. The day after a friend's funeral, a group of women play a round of golf in her memory. The setting is a golf course, but the conversation swirls around the major components that make up life. Dates: April 3-6, 2024. Director: Stacey Paus.

The Play That Goes Wrong, by Henry Lewis, Jonathan Sayer and Henry Shields. The script goes wrong. The set goes wrong, Props go wrong. The effects go wrong. Everything goes wrong. This comedic tour de force by England's Mischief Theatre has had television and live audiences rolling in laughter for a decade.

Dates: June 12-15, 2024. Director: Jean Taylor.

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RLT's 97th season winds up June 7-10 with the mainstage presentation of *Steel Magnolias*. Director Bryce Schlamp offers a glimpse of the preparation for this ever-popular play.

This play is practically notorious as one for which actresses dearly desire to be cast. How did auditions go?

Auditions went really well! I definitely had a number of tough choices to make. This play has a number of very interesting and strong characters that provide an actor a real challenge in the most rewarding ways. There were some very strong reads and even a few tears in the room as we got through some of the more touching scenes. In the spirit of the story and the connection of the characters, we even finished the second evening with some stories and introductions as we had some actors who were only newly in Canada and Regina reading. It was a great moment to be a part of.



What are key aspects or components that make Steel Magnolias so compelling?

For me this is a story about connection, love and support and how the web of people around a person can support and sustain them through both thick and thin. We see these characters through joyous occasions and tragic ones. Through it all they return to this place and this group of people to find support. We all have groups of people like that in our lives, and I think audiences can see themselves and their own lives in this glimpse into this particular group.

Steel Magnolias debuted back in 1987 and this is at least the third time that Regina Little Theatre will stage it. What makes it timeless, or keeps it fresh?




Longtime Regina Little Theatre volunteers **Nora Berg** and **Jean Taylor** were among the recipients of the Queen Elizabeth II Platinum Jubilee Medal presented at Government House on February 28.

The awards, presented by Lt.-Gov. Russ Mirasty -- an Honorary Patron of RLT who along with his wife Donna Mirasty has graced our audience several times – commemorated Elizabeth II's 70th anniversary as monarch. To honour her service to Canada, the medals were presented to Saskatchewan residents with an exceptional record of service to their communities.

Nora and Jean's service to RLT spans five decades, going all the way back to the 1980s.

Nora is one of our most prolific and accomplished directors. She has been the driving force behind dozens of productions and earned multiple Theatre Saskatchewan awards for both her acting and directing. Nora has served numerous terms (including current) on the board of directors and, among other tasks, is usually leading the team in the kitchen for snacks and Green Room parties.

Jean also has a long record of acting and directing with RLT. Perhaps her greatest contribution has been to take on the daunting task of directing December shows with a holiday theme that involve enormous casts, many
